It's a really busy time of year in Rowan, with lots of exciting, end of year activities and events going on.



A person who writes for newspapers, magazines or news websites or prepares news for broadcast.

Paparazzi

A freelance photographer, who follows public figures to get photos of them.

Sensationalism

Presenting news stories in a way that causes public interest and excitement.

Year 6 97.4%


Well done to Year 1 and Year 6 who have exceeded the 96% target again this month.
